They provide habitat for birds and other wildlife, as well as being the lungs of the plant. They breathe in carbon dioxide and breathe out oxygen, which is then taken in by humans and other living creatures. The list just goes on as to the benefits of our trees.

TYPES OF TREES

The Noblesville Parks Foundation, a not-for-profit organization, has chosen 11 trees, which have been broken down into three categories: shade trees, ornamental trees, and evergreen trees. Your selection maybe made from the following list of 11 trees given in this brochure.

WHERE WILL THE TREE BE PLANTED?

The selected tree of your choice will be planted in the park of your choice, depending on availability. We have presently five parks to choose from: Forest Park, Dr. James A. Dillon Park, Seminary Park, Southside Park and still under development, Hague Road Park.

WHAT ABOUT THE PLAQUE?

The color of your recognition leaf plaque is dependent upon what category of tree you choose. When we receive your dedication form, your leaf plaque will be engraved with your selected dedication. The plaque will then be placed on the Tree of Life Dedication located in the rotunda of Noblesville City Hall.

Shade Trees | Gold leaf plaque—\$275

SELECTED OAK

Oaks are trees with wide-spreading foliage and are very majestic. In the fall, they range in color from brilliant reds and oranges to golden bronze.

SELECTED MAPLE

Maples are beautiful, large, fast-growing trees. The have vibrant colors in the fall, and beautiful green foliage in the summer months.

SWEET GUM

This tree has glossy, dark green star-shaped leaves which turn a magnificent range of colors in the fall, from a yellow to orange, climaxing into hues of red and burgundy. It is a fast growing native tree and can reach to heights of 80 feet.

RIVER BIRCH

This is a water loving tree and has a lovely papery cinnamon bark and graceful crown. It is a beautiful tall and lacy looking tree.

Evergreen | Silver leaf plaque—\$250

WHITE PINE

This fast-growing, greenish blue tinted, soft-toothed pine will grow to 50-80 feet high with a spread of 20-40 feet. It has a plum-like outline which makes it very distinctive.

NORWAY SPRUCE

This long living spruce is also called the red pine because of its pale red wood and reddish bark. At maturity it will stand 80 feet tall with a 36" diameter. Truly a magnificent giant.

BALDCYPRESS

The native Baldcypress is one of the few conifers which does not remain green year-round. In the fall, the light-green needle-like leaves begin turning shades of cinnamon and tan. These feathery leaves fall from the tree in winter showing off the tree's characteristic tan, textured bark

EASTERN REDCEDAR

This tree has short, olive-colored foliage. This is a medium-sized tree and can reach heights of 30 feet or more. As a native tree to our area, the tree's ball-shaped fruit is a prized food source for over 50 species of animals.

Ornamental | Bronze leaf plaque—\$225

REDBUD

The redbud is highly known for its delicate, lavender-pink-colored blossoms which bloom in the spring. It is a rapid grower and can achieve heights of 20 feet or more at maturity.

CRABAPPLE

This ornamental tree grows between 15 to 25 feet at maturity. It blooms in the spring with deep reds to pinkish whites or white which will bring forth little red apples in the summer.

SERVICEBERRY

This tight, multi-stemmed shrub can grow between 6 to 20 feet tall. It will produce a pretty white flower in the spring followed by a black fruit. In the fall, the serviceberry has a yellow and gold aura and may be sprinkled with oranges and reds.
