Noblesville Parks and Recreation Board Minutes May 2, 2018

MEMBERS PRESENT: Steve Rogers, Scott Noel, and Carl Johnson.

OTHERS PRESENT: Brandon Bennett, Director; Mike Hoffmeister, Assistant Director; Abigail Hash, Board Secretary; Nicole Haberlin, Recreation Director; Mike Howard; Chuck Lehman, Robert Harrington, Public Affairs Manager; Steve Unger; Issac Asburry.

CALL TO ORDER: Meeting was called to order by Steve Rogers at 6:09pm. Mr. Rogers made a motion to add to agenda New Business the consideration to set a motion to grant approval to take any legal action against ITM that is necessary. Mr. Johnson seconded, the motion was approved unanimously. Mr. Rogers asked to add the addition of the approval of minutes from the executive meeting and also move reports to the end of the meeting.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Mr. Steve Rogers asked if there were any other additions or deletions to the agenda. Mr. Rogers asked for the approval of the Agenda as presented. Mr. Noel moved to approve the Agenda to reflect the items previously discussed and Mr. Johnson seconded this motion. No further discussion was held and the motion passed unanimously.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES of April 9, 2018 Board Meetings and Executive Board Meeting. Mr. Rogers asked for the approval of April 9, 2018 minutes and Executive Board Meeting. Mr. Noel moved to approve the minutes for the April 9, 2018 Board meeting and the Executive Board Meeting as presented and Mr. Johnson seconded this motion. No further discussion was held and the motion passed unanimously.

Approved Additional Business

The city believes it may be necessary to bring a law suit against ITM. The lease for ITM expired March 1, it has now been over 60 days with no response. Mr. Rogers motion that the board has been approved to take any action that is necessary and required in response to ITM. Mr. Noel set into motion, Mr. Johnson second, passed unanimously

Recreation Report

Nicole Haberlin stated the Recreation Department is doing very well. The Recreation numbers are up on Summer Camp as well as Ivy Tech. Changes that are going to be happening will be very positive. Mr. Noel stated that there have been some issues at the Boys and Girls club due to parent negative behavior during the High School Boys and Girls club Basketball League. He wanted to bring awareness of necessary of security. Contract with Ivy Tech will be brought to the next meeting.

Director of Golf Report

No official report from Gary, Mr. Brandon Bennett stated. The Golf Director has gotten a lot of small projects completed, including the lightening detection, as well as stickers on the carts to let golfers know what the alarms mean. The full time landscaper has started and is already hard at work. The cold storage barn has been concreted so it is no longer a dirt and gravel floor.

Assistant Director Report

Mr. Mike Hoffmeister stated that for Maintenance projects our sand volleyball court has been worked on, we have added 5 trucks of sand and the new poles all being completed. Tennis courts have been milled and we are currently waiting for parking lot to complete so that concrete guy can come in a put down concrete. #thisismay banner is currently hanging in Federal Hill Commons. Mr. Noel asked about concerts at the park and changing the alcohol policy. We do not search coolers, it is the individual's responsibility. If we have a fenced event and we are serving alcohol we are responsible and have to search coolers. The center restroom is completed, the only thing needed is seeding. There is a fence to block the men's restroom door. There will be a partition, it has been ordered, that will replace the temporary fence. Carousel is 9/10th done, and preservation alliance is out there now painting the floor. After this weekend it will be completed.

OLD BUSINESS

1. None

NEW BUSINESS

- 1. Board to consider contract with Sipe's and change orders #1 and #2 for work at Forest Park
 - a. This is to approve the crack-fill and seal-coating work that is going on at Forest Park to upgrade the roads and parking lot. This project was budgeting in 2017, but because of time delays and scheduling they were unable to complete the project until this year. The contract was signed off by Parks Administration staff and work has already began. Mr. Noel made motion to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 2. Board to consider proposal with Lehman and Lehman
 - a. This proposal with Lehman and Lehman is for the short term, 1-2 year planning prior to the scheduled 5-year Master Plan. Staff reached out to Lehman and Lehman for assistance in a few areas such as creating a short-term deliverable plan for small renovations, potential for the expansion for arts, maintenance and management strategies, succession planning, as well as consolidation and growth with in staff. The staff has proposed this is paid for from Impact Fees. Mr. Johnson set to moved, Mr. Noel seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Board to consider Third Party Marketing Policy
 - a. This policy defines when and how Noblesville Parks & Recreation markets for third party events that happen on Park property. The policy states that there must be direct benefit for Noblesville Parks for any marketing support to be done and that all organizations have similar goals or initiatives. Mr. Noel sets motion to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Board to consider Privacy Policy
 - a. This policy defines when and how Noblesville Parks & Recreation utilizes the data it collects while doing daily business. It is important that we create and adopt a policy that provides guidelines for what staff can and can't do with data, as well as how the dated is collected and handled. This policy also defines credit card usage and software system staff uses to ensure PCI compliance is met. Mr. Johnson moved to approve, Mr. Noel seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 5. Board to consider 2018 Staffing Change Proposal

- a. This proposal is to change the 2018 staffing at Noblesville Parks to include two new job descriptions while dissolving two jobs descriptions. This proposal also comes with the rearranging of the staff organizational chart. These changes have already been approved by the Noblesville Common Council on Tuesday, April 24, 2018. Mr. Noel made motion to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 6. Board to consider MOU with Attic Theater for the Recreation Annex Auditorium
 - a. This memorandum is to clarify a partnership between Attic Theater and Noblesville Parks and Recreation. Noblesville Parks and Recreation would provide access to the Auditorium two weeks before each performance and assist with marketing each event. The Attic Theater perform 4-5 shows per year, pay \$400.00 in rent a show, plus 15% of concessions and ticket sales. The MOU term would be one year. Mr. Johnson moved to approve, Mr. Noel seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 7. Board to consider contract with Stage Tech for work at Federal Hill Commons
 - a. After receiving feedback from our staff, sound technician, and bands performing, it was brought to our attention that show lighting was necessary for our Federal Hill Commons stage. This contract with Stage Tech is to complete stage lighting work for the amount of \$92,999.90. This project will be paid for out of the bond that was approved by the Park Board on April 9, 2018 and Noblesville Common Council on April 10, 2018. 3 quotes were received for this job as required by law. Mr. Noel set to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 8. Board to consider contracts with American Off Road Music Festival
 - a. These contracts essentially state that American Offroad Music Festival will be renting Federal Hill Commons, for a rental fee, for six dates throughout the summer and manage those events. These events will be ticketed shows and will have fencing, private security, police and fire presence, and parks presence. Each show will follow the City of Noblesville noise ordinance. Mr. Noel set motion to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 9. Board to consider agreement with Indy Trolley for events at Federal Hill Commons.
 - a. With expected construction downtown and on the new pedestrian bridge at Logan Street the need for increased transportation service during events has become important and will assist in helping visitors attend events at Federal Hill Commons. We plan to partner with businesses downtown to assist in promoting downtown while adding a level of nostalgia to our events. The current agreement is for all free shows at Federal Hill Commons. We plan to pay for this out of leftover money from the center restroom project. Possibly set up different ways to help not only benefit the Parks, but also the City, Mr. Noel made motion to approve, Mr. Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.
 - b. MOU parking agreement for the lot that use to be owned by Marsh. This MOU gives us the ability to use that lot for our events. This is a benefit with the construction that the city of Noblesville is getting ready to start. This is not for approval, it is simply for you to acknowledge. Mr. Noel made motion that after developer has signed they approve as staff, Mr. Johnson second, motion passed unanimously.
- 10. Board to consider lease with farmer for land at Finch Creek Park for 2018 farming season
 - a. This lease is for the 107 acres of farm property at Finch Creek Park that is currently farm fields. This lease is offered at \$220.00 per tillable acre and is still a fair price. The property has been leased to Mr. Spartzer for the past 8 years and he has worked well with us as we have and to disturb some crops with our design process. He is aware of the future of the park and is willing to work with us as things progress as the site. Adjustments will be made if necessary due to construction in the area of Finch Creek Park. Mr. Noel moved to approve, Johnson seconded, motion passed unanimously.

Park Terms and Definitions:

Summary:

The Schematic Design phase of Seminary park has been completed and staff will share design concepts and budget considerations for the remodel of Seminary Park. This has been presented to the Council Downtown District Committee, and has been given favorable feedback. We anticipate seeking a funding commitment in the next few months and then plan to proceed with Design development of the park and Construction Documents based on the funding level that Council approves. Park board feedback will also be needed as we move into the next phase. Attachments include a timeline, budget potentials and the schematic design.

Background:

Seminary Park was once discussed as a potential site for infill housing, but was met with a passionate response form the local community and this park board. Since then, the discussion has focused on upgrades that might be made to the park to enhance and improve it for the local residents.
